## Correction to the paper "On an Inequality for Minimal Surfaces z = z(x, y)".\*

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The lemma of Heinz quoted under b) in the author's note states: If  $x = x(\alpha, \beta)$ ,  $y = y(\alpha, \beta)$  is a continuous one-to-one mapping of  $\alpha^2 + \beta^2 \le 1$  upon the full set  $x^2 + y^2 \le 1$ , if x(0, 0) = y(0, 0) = 0 and if x, y are harmonic in  $\alpha^2 + \beta^2 < 1$  then

$$\Lambda(x, y) = x_{\alpha}^{2} + x_{\beta}^{2} + y_{\alpha}^{2} + y_{\beta}^{2} |_{\alpha = \beta = 0}$$

has a positive infimum for all those mappings.

On using the Poisson formula which expresses each of those mappings in terms of the boundary mapping  $\omega = \omega(\varphi)$ ,  $\varphi = \text{angle on } \alpha^2 + \beta^2 = 1$ ,  $\omega = \text{angle on } x^2 + y^2 = 1$ , Heinz transformed his lemma into the following equivalent statement.

$$\Lambda(\omega) = \left| \frac{1}{\pi} \int_0^{2\pi} e^{i\omega(\varphi)} \cos \varphi \, d\varphi \, \right|^2 + \left| \frac{1}{\pi} \int_0^{2\pi} e^{i\omega(\varphi)} \sin \varphi \, d\varphi \, \right|^2$$

(which is  $\equiv \Lambda(x, y)$ ) has a positive infimum for all continuous and monotonic functions  $\omega(\varphi)$  with the properties that  $\omega(\varphi + 2\pi) \equiv \omega(\varphi) + 2\pi$  or  $\equiv \omega(\varphi) - 2\pi$  and that

$$\int_{0}^{2\pi} e^{i\omega(\varphi)} d\varphi = 0.$$

At the end of his note the author stated the conjecture that inf  $\Lambda = 16/\pi^2$ . This value is attained by the degenerate harmonic mapping which maps  $\alpha^2 + \beta^2 \leq 1$  upon a diameter of  $x^2 + y^2 \leq 1$  or, equivalently, by the degenerate
