On the Asymptotic Stability of Solutions of Parabolic Differential Equations*

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1. Introduction. We consider in this paper the stability of solutions of a wide class of nonlinear parabolic differential equations having the following general form:

(1.1)
$$\frac{\partial u_{\nu}}{\partial t} = \sum_{i,j} a_{ij}(x) \frac{\partial^{2} u_{\nu}}{\partial x_{i} \partial x_{j}} + \sum_{i} b_{i}(x) \frac{\partial u_{\nu}}{\partial x_{i}} + F(x, t, u_{\mu}),$$

$$i, j = 1, \dots, n; \qquad \nu, \mu = 1, \dots, m; \qquad x \in G; \qquad t > 0.$$

The domain of definition G is a bounded open region in n-dimensional x-space. Suitable conditions are to be imposed on the coefficients $a_{ij}(x)$, $b_i(x)$ and on the nonlinear part F. The solution vector U(x, t) besides satisfying certain obvious continuity and differentiability conditions is assumed to be zero on the boundary Γ of G for $t \geq 0$. It is then shown that for suitably "small" initial values the solution vector tends to zero as t tends to infinity, i.e.,

$$\lim_{t\to\infty} |u_{\nu}(x,t)| = 0 \quad \text{uniformly in } x, \quad \nu = 1, \cdots, m.$$

These details will be made more precise subsequently in the actual statement of the theorems.

The notion of stability of solutions of partial differential equations as used here is a generalisation of the classical definition of stability as applied to solu-

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
