On a Problem of Type, with Application to Elliptic Partial Differential Equations*

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1. Let $\varphi(x, y)$ be a function of class $C^{(n)}$, defined for all finite real values of x and y. The function $\varphi(x, y)$ then represents a surface S over the (x, y) plane which has a simply covered projection on this plane. It is known that for any such surface S, there will exist a complex valued function f(x, y) which maps the whole of S in a 1-1 conformal manner onto a simply-connected open set T of the plane. Loewner has raised the question whether there exist surfaces S such that T will have a finite boundary point. No such surfaces have been discovered. Under certain circumstances, e.g. if S is a surface of revolution or if $(\varphi_x^2 + \varphi_y^2)^{\frac{1}{2}} < K \log (2 + x^2 + y^2)$ for some constant K, it is easy to show that T covers the plane. It has been shown by Blanc & Fiala [4]¹ that if the surface integral of the Gaussian curvature of S is bounded below, then T must cover the plane. It is easy to construct surfaces S for which the surface integral of the Gaussian curvature is not bounded below, but such that T covers the plane.

In the present paper we consider surfaces S which are defined by solutions of variational problems

$$\delta \iint F(p^2+q^2) dx dy = 0, \qquad p = \varphi_x, \quad q = \varphi_y.$$

In addition to the usual requirement of ellipticity,
