On Solutions of Riccati's Equation as Functions of the Initial Values

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Introduction. Subject to mild restrictions on a, b, and c, the general Riccati equation

$$\frac{du}{dy} = a(y) + 2b(y)u(y) + c(y)u^{2}(y)$$

has a solution through any given point of the (u, y) plane. In particular, one may consider that solution which satisfies the initial condition

$$u = 0$$
 when $y = x$

or indeed

$$u = f(x)$$
 when $y = x$

where f(x) is given.

The function u so obtained depends on x, naturally, as well as on y, and our notation emphasizes this feature. In view of the x-dependence it is appropriate to write

$$u = u(x, y)$$

rather than simply u = u(y). We have, then,

$$u_{y} \equiv \frac{\partial u}{\partial y} = a(y) + 2b(y)u(x, y) + c(y)u^{2}(x, y)$$
$$u(x, x) = f(x).$$

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
