## On a Non-Linear Integral Equation\*

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1. In this paper a non-linear integral equation of the form

$$y(t) = \int_0^t \frac{G[y(\tau), \tau]}{\sqrt{\pi(t - \tau)}} d\tau$$

is studied. Such an equation arises in connection with the problem of determining the temperature of a semi-infinite rod whose end is heated by a source of (known) variable temperature  $\phi(t)$ . The rod is assumed to be initially at temperature 0 throughout. The particular case of this problem where  $\phi(t) \equiv 1$  has been studied by W. R. Mann & F. Wolf [3] and by J. H. Roberts & W. R. Mann [4]. The temperature U(x, t) of the point x of the rod at time t satisfies the equations

(1) 
$$U_{xx}(x, t) = U_{t}(x, t), \quad x > 0, \quad t > 0,$$

$$(2) U(x,0) = 0,$$

(3) 
$$-U_x(0, t) = g[U(0, t), \phi(t)]$$

where g(u, v) denotes the rate of flow of heat from the source at temperature v to the end of the rod at temperature u.

In the special case where  $\phi(t)$  is bounded in  $t \ge 0$ , a probable hypothesis is the following:

(4) 
$$|U(x, t)| \leq \text{some constant } M \text{ for } x \geq 0, t \geq 0.$$

As in [3] and [4], the rate of heat diffusion from the source to the end of the rod is assumed to follow a general non-linear law, so that the function g(u, v) satisfies the following conditions, which are clearly direct generalizations of the conditions on g assumed in [3] and [4]:

(5) g(u, v) is continuous in both the variables u and v.

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
