Integral Equations of the Schwarzschild-Milne Type*

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1. Introduction. The Schwarzschild-Milne integral equation of radiative transfer theory is

(1)
$$f(x) = \frac{1}{2} \int_0^\infty E_1(|x - y|) f(y) \, dy, \qquad x \ge 0,$$

where

(2)
$$E_1(t) = \int_0^1 e^{-t/\mu} \mu^{-1} d\mu, \qquad t > 0.$$

Auxiliary conditions are $f(x) \ge 0$ and $f(x) \equiv 0$. The integral equation was generalized by Hopf [1] and is further generalized in this paper.

Let K_1 be any function such that

$$(3) K_1(t) \ge 0,$$

$$\int_{-\infty}^{\infty} K_1(t) dt = 1,$$

$$\int_{-\infty}^{\infty} K_1(t)t \ dt = 0,$$

(6)
$$\int_{t}^{\infty} K_{1}(\pm s) ds \leq CK_{1}(\pm t), \qquad t \geq 0,$$

where C is some positive constant. These conditions are satisfied with $K_1(t) = \frac{1}{2}E_1(|t|)$ and C = 1. Let Λ denote the integral operator such that

(7)
$$(\Lambda f)(x) = \int_0^\infty K_1(x-y)f(y) \ dy, \qquad x \ge 0,$$

whenever the right member exists for all $x \ge 0$. The problem defined by

(8)
$$f = \Lambda f, \quad f \ge 0, \quad f \equiv 0$$

is the announced generalization.
