Some Extremal Problems for a New Class of Univalent Functions

1. Much attention in the past has been devoted to the study of various extremum problems for the class V of functions f(z) regular and univalent in the unit circle |z| < 1 and normalized so that f'(0) = 1 and for its different subclasses, for example, the class V_R of real univalent functions which lead to symmetric domains, the class of functions for which the image domains are convex or star-like and the class of bounded univalent functions whose image domains lie within a fixed circle. In the present paper we consider problems for another class S of regular univalent functions f(z) which are real on the real axis and whose image domains contain the unit circle, the functions being normalized so that f(0) = 0 and f(1) = 1. Some of the simplest functions belonging to the class S are the identity function z and the Koebe function $K(z) = 4z/(1+z)^2$. We observe that if $f(z) \in S$ then f(z)/z is regular analytic in |z| < 1 and hence, by the minimum principle, we have

$$|f(z)| \ge |z|.$$

Thus at a given point $\zeta \in U_z(|z| < 1)$ the identity function f(z) gives the minimum absolute value in the class S.

As a consequence of (1) we have, in the limit when $z \to 0$, that $|f'(0)| \ge 1$. Further, let f(z) ε S have the following power series expansion in |z| < 1:

$$f(z) = a_1 z + a_2 z^2 + a_3 z^3 + \cdots,$$

where a_1 , a_2 , a_3 , \cdots are all real. We then see that the function $f(z)/a_1$ belongs to the class V_R of functions F(z) which are normalized so that F(0) = 0 and F'(0) = 1. Thus an application of the Koebe quarter theorem immediately gives

$$|a_1| = |f'(0)| \le 4.$$

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
