A Note on "The Method of Characteristics for a Perfect Compressible Fluid in General Relativity and Non-Steady Newtonian Mechanics"

- 1. Introduction. In our previous paper [1], we used the terms (1) "order of a quantity" and (2) "order of a quantity as compared to another quantity". Further, we obtained the characteristic system for a compressible fluid in non-steady Newtonian mechanics from the characteristic system of a compressible fluid in relativity theory under the assumption that a/c is of order zero, where a is the local sound speed and c is the speed of light [1]. In this paper, we shall formulate precise definitions of the terms "order of a quantity" and "order of a quantity as compared to another quantity". Also we shall show that the characteristic system in the non-steady Newtonian case can be obtained without use of the assumption that a/c is of order zero. All of the previously derived equations for the Newtonian case remain valid.
- 2. Definitions and the Basic Order Assumption. We define the term "order of the quantity Q" by use of the maximum range of values through which the absolute value of the quantity may vary. Two types of quantities will be considered: Newtonian quantities; relativistic quantities. If the absolute value of Q is such that

$$(2.1) |Q| \le 10^k$$

then Q will be said to be of order one. We assume that k is chosen so that 10^k is the upper bound of the magnitude of the velocity in Newtonian mechanics. In the foot-second system, k=5 would appear to suffice. For quantities in relativity theory, it is desirable to compare magnitudes with powers of the
