On the Foundations of Dynamic Programming

1. Introduction. Let X_T be the class of all piecewise continuously differentiable functions x on [0, T] such that x(0) = 0, let F be a function of two real variables satisfying conditions which will be specified in §2, and set

(1.1)
$$f(c, T) = \min_{\substack{x \in X_T \\ x(T) = c}} \int_0^T F(x(t), x'(t)) dt.$$

One of the basic problems of dynamic programming is to approximate the value p(c, T) of the *optimal policy* or *slope function* at the point (c, T) in terms of F and the values $f(c_1, T - \epsilon)$, for some fixed $\epsilon > 0$ and a suitable range of values of c_1 . In this formulation p is the slope function of the field of extremals through (0, 0); however, the considerations which follow can equally well be applied to other fields.

Heuristically, one may use Bellman's principle of optimality as follows. For any $\epsilon > 0$,

(1.2)
$$\min_{\substack{x \in X T \\ x(T) = c}} \int_0^T F(x(t), x'(t)) dt$$

$$= \min_{\substack{x \in X T \\ x(T) = c}} \left\{ f(x(T - \epsilon), T - \epsilon) + \int_{T - \epsilon}^T F(x(t), x'(t)) dt \right\},$$

and since p(c, T) = x'(T) for the minimizing function x, one approximates the functions of X_T by setting $x(T - \epsilon) = c - \epsilon c' + o(\epsilon)$ and expands (1.2) in terms of ϵ to obtain

(1.3)
$$F(c, T) = \min_{\epsilon} \{f(c - \epsilon c', T - \epsilon) + \epsilon F(c, c') + o(\epsilon)\}.$$

Ignoring the $o(\epsilon)$, it appears plausible that if $p_{\epsilon}(c, T)$ is that value of c' which minimizes the expression

$$(1.4) f(c - \epsilon c', T - \epsilon) + \epsilon F(c, c')$$

then

(1.5)
$$\lim_{\epsilon \to 0} p_{\epsilon}(c, T) = p(c, T).$$
