## On the Geometrical Significance of the Moments of Order Statistics and of Deviations of Order Statistics from the Mean in Samples from Gaussian Populations

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1. Introduction and summary. Let  $\xi \equiv \xi_{r|n}$  denote the  $r^{\text{th}}$  largest observation in a random sample of n observations from a normal population with zero mean and unit variance. Then the elementary probability law of  $\xi$  is given by

(1) 
$$n\binom{n-1}{r-1}[\Phi(\xi)]^{r-1}[1-\Phi(\xi)]^{n-r}\phi(\xi),$$

where

$$\begin{split} \phi(\xi) &= (2\pi)^{-\frac{1}{2}} e^{-\frac{1}{2}\xi^2}, \\ \Phi(\xi) &= (2\pi)^{-\frac{1}{2}} \int_{-\pi}^{\xi} e^{-\frac{1}{2}\eta^2} d\eta. \end{split}$$

(See e.g. Wilks [4].)

We shall investigate the distribution of  $\xi_{r|n}$ , the  $r^{th}$  order statistic, and that of  $\xi_{r|n} - \bar{\xi}$ , the deviation of the  $r^{th}$  order statistic from the sample mean ( $\bar{\xi} = \sum_{1}^{n} \xi_{r|n}/n$ ), from the point of view of the moments of these distributions. It will appear that the latter moments are directly related to certain geometrical moments of members of a class of simplices, referred to as skew-regular simplices, in (n-2)-dimensional spherical space.

Skew-regular hyperspherical simplices of dimensionality m-1 are generated from a regular hyperspherical simplex as follows. Consider a regular simplex constructed on the surface of a sphere (which for convenience may be taken as

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
